leadership of Michael Sissons and the inspired co-ordination of Naomi Russell, mounted a memorable fund-raising evening at the Inner Temple on 6 March. This proved to be an excellent venue and the staff were thoroughly helpful throughout the planning process (all made considerably easier by the gentle guidance of Michael Kennedy, whose chambers are located there and who first suggested the venue). Through the generosity of those who attended and supported us, The Cardinall's Musick is able to continue with its ambitious plans, having raised in excess of £40,000.

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#### Not so secret agent RAYFIELD ARTISTS: FROM STRENGTH TO STRENGTH

Since September 2005, The Cardinall's Musick has been represented by Ben Rayfield of Rayfield Artists. Ben brings a wealth of experience to his work and is himself a singer who has not only an unparalleled knowledge of and interest in vocal performance but also understands the pitfalls and difficulties of touring and concert organisation. He has the right mix of charm and firmness to deal with promoters around the world, and he has an excellent roster of singers, including Emma Kirby and Robin Blaze, the great organ virtuoso Dame Gillian Weir, and the medieval ensemble Gothic Voices. Throughout the year, Ben is in contact with promoters and festivals about performances by TCM. Telephone conversations, e-mails, letters and personal correspondence flow constantly to keep people up to date with our new programmes and developments. Like any market brand, we have to be new, fresh and interesting at all times. This can be a slow process as festival directors are often inundated with requests from ensembles and soloists alike but with one of the most sympathetic and dedicated agents in the business, all seems set fair for a continuing increase in the Cardinall's concert schedule.

# Education project update

SCHOOL WORKSHOPS ARE A GREAT SUCCESS

The Cardinall's Musick has now undertaken eight workshops in schools around the UK. By using historical themes and subjects as a starting point-Henry VIII and The Gunpowder Plot appear to be the most popular-we hope to give students an entrée into the wonderful world of Renaissance music. The advantage of this approach is that we do not exclusively need to target children who are studying music but can appeal to anyone who has studied a little of this history. We spend time talking about the context and how the music is put together and go on to discuss our own voices, the nature of our professional work and how to direct the group in performance—some of the young conductors have proved to be rather good!

So far we have been reliant on the generosity of private sponsors who have connections with various schools but now, thanks to the success of our own fund-raising efforts, The Cardinall's Musick is in a position to promote three workshops ourselves.

Having devised a successful format, want to take it further into the community, especially to those schools for whom such an event would normally be impossible because of insufficient funding.

The first of these will happen on 25 June at Chestnut Grove School in Wandsworth and we have plans for two more further north in the country. The support of our friends has helped to turn this ambition into a reality.

## Christmas success at St John's Smith Square

The Cardinall's Musick's appearance at St John's, Smith Square has become an annual event and we were delighted by the capacity audience for our Tallis and Byrd concert on 18 December 2006. So was *The Daily Telegraph*...

#### Thrilling echoes of turbulent times

'This concert was devoted to two composers who epitomised those turbulent times in music: Thomas Tallis and his pupil—and eventual colleague and business partner— William Byrd.

'If there was a theme evident in the sound itself, it was the fierceness of the doctrinal debates over music. On the one hand we had the ostentatiously plain English psalm tunes by Tallis. These were written for the new English liturgy, so comprehensibility was the rule. On the other, we had long, glorious swathes of old-style Catholic polyphony, written by both composers even after the Reformation (Queen Elizabeth turned a blind eye to their religious backsliding). Here the words seem to go on so long that you forgot what the first syllable was: in any case, you hardly cared, because the tangle of melodic lines was so gorgeous in itself.

'These performances eloquently revealed the virtues of both styles. Tallis' psalm tunes may look plain, but when their melodies are made shapely and supple, and the words uttered with conviction, they're revealed to

#### FAYRFAX MASSES (ASV GAUDEAMUS CDGAX353)



The Cardinall's Musick won its first Gramophone Award for a recording of music by Robert Fayrfax, one of the most famous composers of the early

16th century. He worked for both Henry VII and Henry VIII and produced five magnificent festal masses, that is, largescale, grand settings designed to please the Almighty and impress visitors to the royal court. The complete works of this great man were recorded on five CDs but there is also a boxed set which contains all five masses—*Missa O quam glorifica, Missa Tecum principium, Missa Albanus, Missa O bone Jesu, Missa Regali*—together with a newly discovered motet *Resurrexio Christi,* recorded and released here for the first time.

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be little gems. The bigger, more elaborate pieces needed a different approach. They're written in long, overlapping paragraphs which can so easily lose their tension and sag. But by cleverly varying the pace and making the counterpoint vividly clear, the director, Andrew Carwood, created a thrilling cumulative tension. The ending of Tallis' *Salve intemerata virgo* was as overwhelming as a Mahler symphony, at a tenth of the volume.'
